Answering the Call in New Orleans

Young people, their parents, family members and educators gathered at SABIS Academy in New Orleans for workshops with Ron Anderson designed to assist them in their efforts toward recovery after the largest natural disaster to befall this nation. "The opportunity to serve in New Orleans was an incredible experience," Anderson said. "The aftermath of the hurricane and flooding...the devastation was numbing. And there was a powerful, unexpected consequence for me...one that I'll always remember."

After the second day of workshops for those affiliated with the LightHouse Program of New Orleans, Anderson was on a flight back to Shreveport when it occurred to him. It struck him deeply.

"No one had complained," he says. "No one. I was working with people who had lost everything...their homes, schools, jobs, friends and family members. I met teachers who were

living three at a time in FEMA trailers. They had been in shelters all over the country.... and they made their way back to the city that they love, to teach the children of their city. They weren't complaining. Their perspective was and is clear: they are moving forward, rebuilding their lives, being of service to one another. I continue to be inspired by them."

LightHouse Program Director Melvin Howard says that he invited Anderson based on a speech that he heard him deliver. "When I heard him, I was amazed. I noticed how well-received he was by the others in the crowd. I had always wanted to invite him to do presentations for those whom I serve."

Howard says that he is very pleased with the results of the recent workshops. "Not only was I pleased, but many of the parents told me how much they appreciated that I brought him here. They felt that he was not only knowledgeable, but heartfelt and sincere."

"I continue to be touched by this experience. We must follow the example of these Americans," Anderson says. "When we feel the need to complain, we must remember the plight of those who would give anything to have the daily issues that we have. We have our schools; we have our homes, our jobs, our friends and families. We must remember that there are always those that have less, and we must celebrate their fortitude. After serving in New Orleans, I know that I do."

LHC Promotes Service at Banquet



When the administrators and employees representing Louisiana's Housing Council arrived at their banquet luncheon in Bossier City, they were skeptical of the upcoming program. Having spent the entire morning in seminars and anticipating heading out to the Boardwalk and other local attractions, the last obstacle to endure consisted of a "do-good, feel-better" speech. Guest speaker Ron Anderson knew the best way for the audience to give itself a deserved pat on the back consisted of acknowledging its contributions to the clients and communities that they serve.
